This presentation will include information on the NICS process with an overview of the ten federal firearm prohibitions. The discussion will primarily focus on the two federal prohibitions specific to domestic violence: the Misdemeanor Crime of Domestic Violence federal prohibition-922(g)(9), and the Protection Order federal prohibition-922(g)(8). Attendees will gain knowledge of the role they play in sharing information needed to determine if a firearm transfer is disqualifying under these DV prohibitions.
